TOWN OF WESTPORT

DEMOGRAPHICS

- 28,000+ population*
- 8 schools
- Poverty rate 4.15%*
- Median household income \$206,466*
- No Town-wide solid waste pick-up:
 - transfer station or private hauler

SOLID WASTE CRISIS

Increasing Costs; In Need of Solutions

CONNECTICUT'S WASTE PROBLEM

- Over 22% of CT's Solid Waste (trash) is FOOD
- CT burns trash: "waste to energy"; CT has no municipal landfills
- 40% of our trash goes to Ohio and Pennsylvania landfills
- Food waste is heavy, expensive to transport, burns poorly in CT's Waste-to-Energy Incinerators and...
- EPA report found 58% of fugitive methane emissions at MSW landfills came from wasted food



NEW EPA WASTED FOOD SCALE





SUSTAINABLE WESTPORT' GOAL



- Westport residential solid waste: 10,000 tons/year
- Residential Food Scraps: 2,200 tons/year
- 25% of Residential Food Scraps: 550 tons/year



ZERO FOOD WASTE CHALLENGE

THREE WAYS TO DECREASE WASTED FOOD IN THE SOLID WASTE STREAM

- Buy only what you need, manage food well
- Redistribute Food
- Food Scrap Recycling

THREE WAYS TO PARTICIPATE IN FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING

- Food Scrap Hauler (private pay)
- Home Compost
- Westport Transfer Station Drop-off (free)









REDISTRIBUTE FOOD

- Gillespie Center and Homes with Hope
- Grow-a-Row (at Westport Farmers Market)
- Food Rescue US Fairfield County food distribution

FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING IN WESTPORT

The Town of Westport has launched a food scrap recycling program! Residents can now bring ALL food scraps to the Food Scrap Drop-Off Area at the Westport Transfer Station. The material is then brought to a commercial compost facility and turned into soil! All food scraps are accepted (more than just backyard composting items) including:

- FRUITS
- RICE
- VEGETABLES PASTA
- DAIRY BREAD
- RAW & COOKED FOOD CUT FLOWERS
- NAPKINS & PAPER TOWELS*
- WAX PAPER · AND MORE! For a complete list COFFEE GROUNDS & FILTERS visit SustainableWestport.org

PAPER TEA BAGS

*No napkins or paper towels that have been used with chemical cleaners



Bring food waste to the transfer station in a lidded, leak-proof container, or use a starter kit, as follows:

COLLECT food scraps & paper products in a countertop pail using BPI Certified compostable bags. No stickers, twist ties or rubber bands.

STORE bags of food scraps in a storage and transportation bin





WHAT DO I NEED TO START?

Although they are not required, food scrap recycling "starter kits" make it easy. Kits are \$25/kit (discounts available for income-eligible) and include:

- · Countertop pail
- Storage and transportation bin
- · Roll of 25 compostable bags

TRANSFER STATION FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING

- Collect food in a lidded container
- Bring to transfer station
- Empty container into large green toter
- Food scraps are brought to a composting site (New Milford) or anaerobic digester (Southington)
- Compost given to public for free (year one)



COLLECTION SYSTEMS

MANY OPTIONS FOR FOOD SCRAPS COLLECTION

- Westport Starter kits (\$25)*
- Or any lidded container
- May be lined with BPI-certified**
 Compostable bag

WHAT CAN BE COMPOSTED at TRANSFER STATION



ALL FOOD SCRAPS ARE ACCEPTED INCLUDING:

- Animal-based food scraps (including bones)
- Fish & Shellfish
- Coffee grounds & filters
- Eggshells
- Cut flowers

PUT YOUR BANANA PEELS TO GOOD USE

If we separate food scraps from the rest of our trash, they can be composted. The results?

- · Cleaner air and water
- · More fertile and resilient soil
- . Less incinerator ash to truck to a landfill

WHERE DO MY BANANA PEELS

You might not know this, but Westport's solid waste is incinerated—and food scraps are wet and heavy. so they don't burn well. Plus, they are expensive



COMPOSTING IS FASIFR THAN YOU THINK

In Westport, you have three options for keeping your food scraps out of the incinerator:

- 1. Drop them off at the transfer station! This is a FREE and easy choice .
- 2. Have your food scraps picked up curbside by a licensed food scrap hauler.
- 3. Compost at home-also FREE!

WHAT FISE CAN I DO?

Did you know that an astonishing 30-40% of the U.S. food supply goes to waste? Just a little planning can help you waste less of the food you buy. A few tips:

- · Plan meals before you go grocery shopping.
- · Preserve (or eat) food before it spoils.
- . Move expiring food to the front of your fridge.
- . Don't "over-prepare" by cooking too much food.
- · Save (and enjoy eating) leftovers.

3 WAYS TO RECYCLE FOOD SCRAPS

OPTION 1: DROP-OFF AT THE WESTPORT TRANSFER STATION

- . COLLECT all food scraps in a countertop pail. You may use BPI Certified compostable bags. No stickers, twist ties or rubber bands.
- . STORE food scraps in a storage and transportation bin.
- BRING your storage and transportation bin to the transfer station and empty food scraps into the larger bins at the Food Scrap Drop-Off Area.

Although it is not required, a food scrap recycling "starter kit" makes it easy. Kits are \$25 each (discounts available for income-eligible) and include: a countertop pail, a storage and transportation bin and a roll of BPI Certified compostable bags. Kits are available at Earthplace (address below).

Hire a Westport-licensed food scrap hauler to pick up your food scraps curbside, at your home. As with the transfer station drop-off site, you can recycle ALL food scraps, including animal-based foods such as meat, bones, fish, cheese, and oils. Visit SustainableWestport.org for information about food scrap haulers in Westport. and monthly fees.

Not sure how? Visit SustainableWestport.org to learn. Note: it is generally recommended that no animal-based foods be put in a home composting system






ZERO FOOD WASTE PROGRESS 2020-PRESENT

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO IMPROVE PARTICIPATION? MAKE FOOD SCRAP RECYCLING COMPULSORY!!





WHAT CAN BE DONE TO IMPROVE PARTICIPATION?



Pay As You Throw (PAYT) aka Unit Based Pricing!!

From Stonington, CT website

- Pay for the amount of trash and food scraps you throw out
- Factored into the cost of these bags is the cost of transportation and disposal at the Waste to Energy facility
- Treats trash like other utilities (electricity, water, natural gas)
- Reduces the tons of trash generated and therefore reduces disposal costs by as much as 45-60%

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO IMPROVE PARTICIPATION?

Locally:

- Promotion by more Town Influencers
- More locations to Recycle Food Scraps
- Town ordinance that requires Residential Food Scrap Recycling

Statewide:

- More support to implement current solid waste programs
- More options and funding for recycling food scraps
- Enforcement of solid waste laws

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO IMPROVE PARTICIPATION?

Legislatively at State Level:

- Lower 26 tons/year threshold for commercial entities
- Provide funding to meet law requirements
- Require Residential Food Scrap Recycling
